Students attending Ontario schools must have proof of immunization against diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, polio, measles, mumps, rubella (German measles) and meningococcal disease. Students born on or after January 1, 2010, require varicella (chicken pox) vaccine. Renfrew County and District Health Unit is required to have this information by law (*Immunization of School Pupils Act, 1990*).

Effective Sept 1st, 2017, as required under the Immunization of School Pupils Act, parents who intend to submit a non-medical exemption are required to complete an immunization education session provided by Renfrew County and District Health Unit in addition to submitting the revised Statement of Conscious Religious or Belief Affidavit.

School Immunization Checklist

For your children to attend school in Ontario, they need to be immunized against the following infectious diseases:

- Pertussis (whooping cough)
- Varicella (chickenpox)*
- Meningococcal disease

New mandatory immunizations

- Tetanus
- Diphtheria
- Polio
- Mumps

New dose requirements

- Measles
- Rubella

Requirements have not changed.
