

Pre-immunization Procedures: Assessment



Pre-immunization Procedures: Consent

Confirm

Confirm that the client has an understanding of the information that they have been provided.

Provide

Provide the client with the opportunity to ask questions, and provide answers. Confirm that the client consents to the immunization(s).

Ensure

Ensure the client or the parent/legal guardian has signed the consent form

 According to the CNO (2011), whoever requires informed consent for a procedure should also obtain the client's signature.

Capacity to Provide Consent

- ✓ The client must understand information and appreciate the
 foreseeable consequences of his/her decision.
- ✓ If a nurse has any doubts about informed consent or the medical condition of a client, consult with Coordinator (if after hours, contact supervisor on call).

Concept Check

- ✓ Nurses support clients in the informed decision-making process by providing current, relevant and evidenced based information to them.
- ✓ Nurses are responsible and accountable for safe medication administration which includes being aware of the benefits, risks, allergies, contraindications and precautions of each medication to be administered.

Practice Standards

- ✓ A nurse must consider the following **before** administering COVID-19 vaccine:
- has informed consent been obtained?
- is a medical directive in place?
- 3. is the nurse competent to deliver and manage the vaccine?
- 4. how will administration of the vaccine be documented?

Prevention of Anaphylaxis

- ✓ Screen client prior to immunization for possible allergy to vaccine or vaccine components.
- ✓ Ensure you know where the epinephrine kit is located and that it is complete.

Immunization Procedure

- Wash hands thoroughly.
- Lay out equipment for the injection on a clean disposable towel.
- Check that the vaccine on hand for the injection is correct.
- Check the expiry date.
- Inspect the appearance of the vaccine for irregularities (i.e. cloudiness, particles, discolouration).
- ✓ If the vaccine was pre-drawn, check the label on the syringe and the appearance of the vaccine in the syringe.

Route

- ✓ All COVID-19 Vaccines are administered intramuscularly (IM)
 - Adults and children* ≥ 1 year: deltoid muscle
 - Children* < 1 year: vastus lateralis muscle
 - *Note: COVID-19 Vaccines are not authorized for individuals under the age of 5 at this time




Figura 3.- Via inframuscular





Procedure for IM injections



Intramuscular (IM) Injection: Adult

- ✓ Needle: 22-25 g, 1" or 1.5" length
- ✓ Site: Deltoid Muscle
- ✓ Measure down <u>three</u> fingers from the Acromion process
- ✓ Using your dominant hand, insert the needle quickly and completely at a 90 ° angle into the muscle
- √ PHO: Injection Technique









Observation Post-Immunization

- ✓ Keep vaccine recipients under supervision for at least 15 minutes.
- ✓ Booster doses 5-15 min.
- ✓In large clinics, post signs advising clients to wait for 15 minutes.

Documentation

- ✓ Documentation for COVID-19 vaccination is done electronically on the Ministry of Health application called COVax.
- ✓ Documentation on paper is also possible on the back of the Ministry of Health consent form. The information will still need to be entered into COVax.
- ✓ Clients may also ask you to complete their personal immunization record. This is optional.
- ✓ Clients will receive a printed and/or email receipt of vaccination from the Ministry of Health, once their vaccine administration is added into COVax.

Practice Standard

- ✓ Nurses ensure that documentation presents an accurate, clear and comprehensive picture of the client's needs, the nurse's interventions and the client's outcomes.
- ✓ Nurses are accountable for ensuring their documentation of client care is accurate, timely and complete.
- ✓ Nurses safeguard client health information by maintaining confidentiality and acting in accordance with information retention and destruction policies and procedures that are consistent with the standard(s) and legislation.
